Rick is active in most all facets of Masonry and has already been a leader in he East in many of these organizations. Master Chief - well done! Right Excellent Companion Fred Kleyn, our Grand Lecturer, received the General Grand Chapter RAM International DSM in Bronze at last year's sessions here in May. In August, at General Grand Chapter sessions in Raleigh, he was personally presented the DSM in Silver by General Grand High Pries Emory "Smokey" Ferguson. He's the first in California to receive both of these prestigious honors. I extend to him my most heartfelt congratulations for his long and distinguished service to our craft.

If there is one constant I have observed in Masonic bodies, it is there is an ebb and flow to the life of the organization in leadership and ritual. I've seen Chapters that, several years ago, I thought might not be around this year rebound and are now growing and providing full ritual teams for one or two degrees at our festivals. Conversely, Chapters that were thriving five years ago are now barely taking in candidates and having trouble opening and closing without stumbling for ritual. It has been a humbling lesson to me – Don't judge too quickly, don't give up too quickly. Just a few, new, motivated Companions

can incite fervor into a few of our 'senior' Companions and get the train back on track. The key is to stay focused and positive. My heartfelt thanks to those 'senior' Companions who have stayed the course in the lulls and stepped up when hey saw the revival coming.

Judy and I appreciate your assistance in the way of donations over the course of the year. As I told you, Judy is a high school English teacher, and she and I decided that we would augment all contributions and donate them to the Fred DeBarrows Scholarship Fund. I'm pleased to say that on November 10, 2011, I was able to write a check in the amount of \$3,000 to be added to the corpus of the fund. That will ensure growth of he Fund as only he interest from that, and the original donation, will be used by the Scholarship Committee in future years, maintaining a core balance. Your continued support to the Scholarship Fund will be used each year to support five of our Masonic youth to pursue higher education.

In the Annual Proceedings you will be able to read about the numerous dispensations I have granted and decisions made. Of particular note: in March 2012, at the behest of the Department 4 Grand Officer, I divided Department IV in two creating Departments 4A and 4B. Under the tutelage of MEC Edgar Fentum, PGHP, I look forward to a request for dispensation to form a new Chapter in the ensuing Capitular year.

As many of you know, I was not only Grand High Priest but also Venerable Master of the San Diego Scottish Rite, Wortthy Patron of Escondido Chapter #154, Order of Eastern Star, and President of the San Diego/Imperial Past Masters Association. THREE GREAT PILLARS

The three great principles on which Freemasonry is founded are Brotherly love, relief, and truth:

- **1. Brotherly Love -** Every true Freemason will show tolerance and respect for the opinions of others and behave with kindness and understanding to his fellow creatures.
- 2. Relief From earliest times Freemasons have been taught to help, to the best of their ability, those in distress, without detriment to any who are dependent upon them, and to give their support to outside Charities, both by charitable giving and by voluntary efforts and works as individuals.
- **3. Truth** Freemasons strive for truth, requiring high moral standards and aiming to achieve them in their own lives and believe that these principles represent a way of achieving higher standards in their public and private lives.

Freemasonry is one of the world's oldest secular fraternal societies and is a society of men concerned with moral and spiritual values. Its members are taught its precepts by a series of ritual dramas. These remain substantially the same form used in stonemasons' lodges, and use stonemasons' customs and tools as allegorical guides.

The secrets of Freemasonry are concerned with its traditional modes of recognition. There is no secret about any of its aims and principles. Like many other societies, it regards some of its internal affairs as private matters for its members.

The Ritual of Freemasonry is a product of the early decades of the 18th century. It contains much of the language of that time period and other words and phrases from the very old work have been incorporated. This is why the language is written and spoken as it is. If the time and effort is spent to study the words of our Ritual, one will discover that the

thoughts and teachings imparted cannot be put in fewer words and still retain their meaning.

The honest answers to the questions when, where and why Freemasonry originated are that we simply do not know. Early evidence Freemasonry is very meager and not enough has yet been discovered - if indeed it even exists - to prove any particular theory. Although it is not yet possible to say when, why or where Freemasonry originated it is known where and when "organized" Freemasonry began. On 24 June 1717 four London lodges came together at the Goose and Gridiron Ale House in St. Paul's Churchyard, London, and formed themselves into a Grand Lodge and elected a Grand Master and Grand Wardens. For the first few years the Grand Lodge was simply an annual feast at which the Grand Master and Wardens were elected, but in 1721 other meetings began to be held and the Grand Lodge began to be a regulatory body. By 1730 it had more than one hundred lodges under its control (including one in Spain and one in India), had published a Book of Constitutions, began to operate a central charity fund, and had attracted a wide spectrum of society into its lodges.

The formation of the Premier Grand Lodge (of England) in 1717 had been followed, around 1725, by the Grand Lodge of Ireland and, in 1736, the Grand Lodge of Scotland. These three Grand Lodges, together with Antients Grand Lodge of 1751, did much to spread Freemasonry throughout the world, to the extent that all regular Grand Lodges throughout the world, whatever the immediate means of their formation, ultimately trace their origins back to one, or a combination, of the Grand Lodges within the British Isles.

The Esoteric Side of Freemasonry - Some Masons study their belief of a deeper esoteric quality to Freemasonry and attribute hidden meanings to the teachings in the ritual. The Origins of Freemasonry, according to some scholars, are considered to have evolved from the Temples and schools of the Ancient Mysteries. The ceremonies of the Ancient Mysteries, some of which marked seasonal festivals, were exceptional occasions of dignity, power and beauty and were presided over by initiate priests who had considerable knowledge of creating ceremonial magic in a beautiful ceremony. These ceremonies were considered to be allegoric representations of

birth and growth and reflected mans' own inner progress along the path of spiritual unfolding. Through the ages the ceremonies have enabled the brethren to search for the deeper esoteric spiritual or hidden meanings of Freemasonry. It could be argued that in the ceremonies some things are only half said, leaving a Brother with the feeling that something is missing. This in turn engenders the need to search for the hidden truths of the allegories and symbols and also for a deeper spiritual meaning. A desire to seek esoteric knowledge will help the serious student to unrayel the inner meanings of the Ceremonies. Although knowledge is important, Freemasonry is free and speculative and values all aspects of study, encouraging a Brother to engage at whichever level of Freemasonry he finds interesting and stimulating.
